

PETER M. ARL,

A witness called on behalf of the Government, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

by Mr. Grossman.

Q What is your name, please?

A Peter M. Arl.

Q The gentleman back there can't hear very well. Talk up just a little bit, please. A Peter M. Arl.

Q What is your occupation, Mr. Arl?

A Manager of the custom shirt department, Marshall Field.

Q Custom Shirt Department, Marshall Field?

A Yes sir.

Q And have you ever met the defendant, Alphonse Capone?

A I have.

Q And did you meet him at Marshall Field's?

A Yes sir.

Q Do you remember the date?

A No, I can't state the date.

Q Do you remember about when?

A 1927-1928.

Q Yes, and did you have any business transactions with him?

A Yes sir.

Q Well, tell us what they were?

A Sold him shirts.

Q Shirts. Did he get them out of stock?

A Custom made.

Q Custom made. What was the price of the shirts?

A They ranged in price from \$18 to \$27 about.

Q Did you make any records at the time?

A Yes, we have records.

Q Pick out your records here, please.

A These are our records (indicating).

Q You have in your hand now the records of the transactions with the defendant, Alphonse Capone?

A Yes sir.

Q Is your recollection refreshed by looking at them?

A Yes.

Q Were they true and correct at the time they were made?

A Yes sir.

Q Now tell us the date when you made custom shirts for him the first time?

A May 18, 1927.

MR. FINK: What date?

A May 18, 1927.

MR. GROSSMAN: Q How many shirts did you make for him at that time?

A Nine.

Q At how much a piece.

A Wait a minute, wait a minute - 12. We made 12.

Q What were the prices?

A Four at \$22.50 each, one at \$25.50, three at \$37 and one at \$50, three at \$12 and 18 collars at \$2 each.

Q 18 collars?

A Yes. Six collars at \$1 each.

MR. FINK: What is that, 18 collars at --

MR. GROSSMAN: At \$2 each.

Q And 24 monograms at \$17 for the 24 monograms.

MR. GROSSMAN: What kind of monograms?

A Monograms on the sleeves of the shirt.

Q Well, did you have any other transactions? Is that all on that day?

A That is all on that day.

Q All right. Any other transactions with the defendant?

A Here are five shirts.

Q What date?

A On November 25, 1927.

Q Yes. A

A Another lot of six shirts, and another lot of six.

Q Are that all on that date, November --

A All on November 25th. These were made for other men.

Q Oh, made for other men?

A Yes, for others.

Q Who paid for them?

A Mr. Capone paid for these, these records indicate.

MR. FINK: Now let me get that straight. This made two batches of six each on November --

A Two batches of six each and one batch of five.

MR. GROSSMAN: What were the amounts paid for the other men?

A On this card here there is three at \$22 each and two at \$24.

Q Is that all?

A And ten collars at \$2 each.

Q Here is another card.

A There is five @22 each and three at \$24.

Q What date?

A The same date, 11/25/27.

Q What else?

A There is 12 collars on that card of \$2 each.

Q Any more shirts?

A Here is another card of six at \$22 each and 12 collars at \$2 each.

Q What date is that?

A November 15, 1927.

Q Have you exhausted that date now?

A That is exhausted, yes sir.

Q Any more dates there?

A April 17, 1928, six shirts made for Mr. Capone, four at \$27.50 --

MR. FINK: Wait a minute, April 17, 1928, six shirts.

A And 12 collars.

MR. GROSSMAN: Q How much were the shirts?

A Four shirts at \$27.50 each and two at \$21.50. Four collars at \$2.50 each and four collars at \$2 each.

Q Any monograms?

A Monograms at \$1 a piece.

Q How many?

A Four shirts were monogrammed at \$1 each.

Q What was the total of the bill?

A It isn't footed up.

MR. FINEK: Were they for the defendant or for other people?

A These last were for Mr. Capone.

MR. GROSSMAN: I offer in evidence the cards.

MR. FINEK: Well, I object to them. What is the use of the cards going into evidence? He has read all the information off them.

MR. GROSSMAN: All right, I will not offer them. You may cross examine.

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
