A mitness called on behalf of the Covernment, having been first duly everm, testified as follows:

DIRECT MIAMINATION

- A Peter M. Arl.
- Q The gentlemen back there can't beer very well. Talk up just a little bit, please. A Feter M. Arl.
- Q Shat is your occupation, Mr. Arl?
- A Manager of the custom shirt department, Marshall Field.
- Q Custom Shirt Department, Marshall Field?
- A Yes mir.
- Q and have you ever met the defendant, Alphonse Capone?
- A I have.
- Q And did you meet him at Marshall Field's?
- A Yes sir.
- Q Do you remember the date?
- A No, I can't state the date.
- Q Do you remaker about when?
- A 1927-1928.
- Q Yes, and did you have any business transactions with him?
- A Yes sir.
- Q Well, tell as that they were?
- A Sold him shirts.
- Q Shirts. Did he get them ent of stock?
- A Custom made.
- Q Custom made. That was the price of the shirts?
- A They reaged in price from \$18 to \$27 about.
- Q Did you make may records at the time?
- A Yes, we have records.
- Q Pich out your records here, please.
- A These are our records (indicating).

- You have in your hand now the records of the transactions with the defendant, Alphonse Capone?
- Yes sir.
- Is your recollection refreshed by looking at them?
- Were they true and sorrect at the time they were made? Yes sir.
- Now tell us the date when you made wastom shirts for him the first time? A May 18, 1927.

MR. FINE: What date? My 18, 1927.

MR. CROSSMAN: Q How many shirts did you make for him at that time?

At how much a piece. Vait a minute, wait a minute - 12. We made 12.

What were the prices? Your at \$22.50 each, one at \$25.50, three at \$37 and one at \$30, three at \$12 and 18 collars at \$2 each.

18 collars? Yes. Six collars at \$1 each.

MR. FIRK: What is that, 18 collars at --

IR. GROSSKAT: At & cach.

And 24 monograms at \$17 for the 24 monograms.

MR. CROSSMAN: What kind of monggrams? Monograms on the sleeves of the shirt.

Well, did you have empother transactions? Is that all on that day? Q 1 That is all on that day.

All right. Any other transactions with the defendant? Here are five shirts.

C What date?

On Borember 25, 1927.

& Another let of six shirts, and another let of six.

As that all on that date, Herenber --All on Hovember 25th. These were made for other men.

- Q Oh, made for other men?
- A Tes. for others.
- Q Who paid for them?
- A Mr. Capone paid for these, these records indicate.

MR. FINK: Now let me get that straight. This made two batches of six each on November --

- A Two batches of six each and one batch of five.
- MR. GROSSMAN: What were the amounts paid for the other men?
- A On this eard here there is three at \$22 each and two at \$24.
- Q Is that all?
- And ten collars at \$2 each.
- Q Here is another eard.
- A There is five \$22 each and three at \$24.
- Q What date?
- A The same date, 11/25/27.
- Q What else?
- A There is 12 collars on that card of \$2 each.
- Q Any more shirts?
- A Here is mother card of six at \$22 each and 12 collars at \$2 each.
- Q That date is that?
- A Bovember 15, 1927.
- Q Have you exhausted that date now?
- A That is exhausted, yes air.
- Q Any more dites t here?
- A April 17, 1928, six shirts made for Mr. Capone, four at \$27.50 -
- MR. FIRK: Vait a minute, April 17, 1928, six shirts.
- A And 12 collars.
- ER. CROSSMAN: Q How much wore the shirts?
- A Four shirts at \$27.50 each and two at \$345.\$21.50. Four collars at \$2.50 each and four collars at \$2 each.
- Q Any monograms?
- A Monograme et \$1 a piece.
- Q How maky?
- A Four shirts were monogrammed at \$1 each.

Q What was the total of the bill?

A It isn't footed up.

MR. FIRK: Were they for the defendant or for other people?

A Those last were for Mr. Capone.

MR. CROSSMAN: I effer in evidence the eards.

MR. FIMM: Well, I object to them. Shat is the use of the eards going into evidence? He hashred all the information off them.

MR. GROSSMAN: All right, I will not offer them. You may cross examine.

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
